III. DISCUSSION OF LEGISLATION

Representative Harris offered a motion to adopt a three-minute rule for presenters, witnesses, and members to speak. Without objection, the motion passed by a vote of 11 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Emerson, Freeman, Freiberg, Jefferson, Charles Owen, Phelps, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

House Bill No. 688 by Representative Phelps

Representative Phelps presented House Bill No. 688, which provides relative to sabbatical leave for teachers.

Representative St. Blanc presented House Bill No. 861, which provides relative to inspections of family child care providers and in-home providers.

Representative St. Blanc offered amendments to House Bill No. 861 in the form of a substitute bill. Representative St. Blanc offered a motion to adopt the substitute bill. Without objection, the substitute bill was adopted by a vote of 10 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Emerson, Freiberg, Jefferson, Charles Owen, Phelps, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

House Bill No. 970 by Representative White

Representative White presented House Bill No. 970, which creates an early childhood literacy program for the purpose of delivering an age-appropriate book monthly to eligible children under the age of five.

House Bill No. 946 by Representative Dustin Miller

Representative Dustin Miller presented House Bill No. 946, which provides relative to the membership and reports of special education advisory councils.

Representative Harris offered amendments that:

1. Changed proposed law regarding the minimum number of council members from 13 to nine and limited the applicability of this provision to schools or school systems with more than 1,000 students.
2. Authorized the inclusion of one high school student with an exceptionality and one person who represents an entity that serves students with disabilities or their families in the parents groups of council members.

Representative Harris offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments. Without objection, the amendments were adopted by a vote of 11 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Freeman, Emerson, Freiberg, Hilferty, Jefferson, Charles Owen, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

House Bill No. 391 by Representative Bryant

Representative Bryant presented House Bill No. 391, which provides relative to tuition for certain nonresident postsecondary students.

Representative Harris offered amendments to limit the applicability of proposed law by excluding private institutions and institutions under the Louisiana State University board of supervisors. Representative Harris offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments. Without objection, the amendments were adopted by a vote of 12 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Freeman, Emerson, Freiberg, Hilferty, Jefferson, Charles Owen, Phelps, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

Representative Jefferson offered a motion to report House Bill No. 391 with amendments. Without objection, House Bill No. 391 was reported with amendments by a vote of 10 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Freiberg, Hilferty, Jefferson, Charles Owen, Phelps, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

House Bill No. 837 by Representative Horton

Representative Horton presented House Bill No. 837, which provides relative to discussion of sexual orientation and gender identity in public schools.

Representative Harris offered amendments to add a definition of "classroom discussion" to mean discussion held during class from the time class begins until the time class ends. Representative Harris offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments. Without objection, the amendments were adopted by a vote of 11 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Brass, Freeman, Freiberg, Hilferty, Jefferson, Charles Owen, Phelps, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea.

Representative Amedée offered amendments that carved out an exception for the topics of sexual orientation and gender identity in classroom discussion and instruction in certain grades in instances where those topics are provided for in-state content standards.

Representative Amedée offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments, to which Representative Jefferson objected. The administrative assistant called the roll, and the amendments were adopted by a vote of 8 yeas and 4 nays. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Emerson, Freiberg, Hilferty, Charles Owen, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted yea. Representatives Brass, Freeman, Jefferson, and Phelps voted nay.

Representative Jefferson offered amendments that removed the prohibition on teachers and others from discussing their sexual orientation or gender identity with students in K-12.

Representative Jefferson offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments, to which Representative Tarver objected. The administrative assistant called the roll, and the motion failed to pass by a vote of 5 yeas and 7 nays. Representatives Brass, Freiberg, Hilferty, Jefferson, and Phelps voted yea. Representatives Harris, Amedée, Freeman, Emerson, Charles Owen, St. Blanc, and Tarver voted nay.
