To enact R.S. 17:421.9, relative to public school psychologists; to provide a salary supplement for certain public school psychologists who have acquired certification by the National School Psychology Certification Board; to provide conditions and guidelines for receiving the supplement; to provide for payment; to provide limitations; to provide definitions; and to provide for related matters.

Reported with amendments by the Committee on Education.

On page 2, line 6, after "salary," delete the remainder of the line and delete lines 7 through 9 in their entirety

AMENDMENT NO. 5

"F.(1) The supplements provided for in this Section shall be phased in as follows:

(a) Those who are entitled to a supplement under this Section in the 2003-2004 school year shall receive one thousand dollars.

(b) Those who are entitled to a supplement under this Section in the 2004-2005 school year shall receive one thousand five hundred dollars.

(c) Those who are entitled to a supplement under this Section in the 2005-2006 school year and thereafter shall receive the supplement otherwise provided for in this Section.

(2) The provisions for phasing in payments pursuant to Paragraph (1) of this Subsection shall not extend the period of eligibility to receive payments.

G. In addition to any other requirements of this Section, to receive the salary adjustment provided by this Section, an otherwise eligible person shall be awarded the initial certificate issued by the National School Psychology Certification Board prior to July 1, 2006. This Subsection is enacted to determine if the salary adjustment will attract and retain full-time school psychologists who hold a valid ancillary certificate approved and issued by the state Department of Education."

§3128.2. Powers relative to student financial assistance

A. The Board of Regents shall formulate policies with respect to student financial assistance which support the goals and objectives of the state's Master Plan for Postsecondary Education. The board shall receive and consider the comments and recommendations of the Louisiana Student Financial Assistance Commission in formulating such policy.

B. The Board of Regents shall be the sole agency responsible for providing advice and recommendations concerning student financial assistance policies to the governor and the legislature, including making recommendations concerning legislation to be proposed as well as pending legislation except that the board may authorize other agencies as deemed appropriate by the board to make recommendations to the governor and the legislature concerning the administration and implementation of such policies.

C. The Louisiana Student Financial Assistance Commission shall submit to the Board of Regents, at the time required by the Administrative Procedure Act for submission to legislative committees, its notice of intent of rulemaking and the report required by R.S. 49:968(D). If the Board of Regents objects to the adoption of the rule and submits such objection in writing to the commission not later than the last day provided by the Administrative Procedure Act for a legislative committee to find the rule unacceptable, the commission shall not adopt the rule. The commission shall not adopt an emergency rule as authorized by the Administrative Procedure Act unless the commission has submitted such proposed emergency rule to the Board of Regents and the Board of Regents has not objected to the adoption of such rule within ten days after receipt of the proposed emergency rule by the Board of Regents.

Section 2. This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2003; if vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become effective on July 1, 2003, or on the day following such approval by the legislature, whichever is later."

Relief in Federal Fiscal Years 2003 and 2004 are consistent with federal requirements and shall not be made prior to such certification."

However, if any such hospital fails to enter into such an agreement with the department, or if it fails to do so in a timely manner, the department is authorized to withhold that hospital's Medicaid and Medicaid-Disproportionate Share payments until such time as the agreement is completed.

A. Medicare upper payment limit monies. The department shall enter into agreements with qualifying non-state public hospitals to transfer to the department any Medicaid payments resulting from application of Medicare upper payment limit principles, as allowed by federal law and rule.

D. Intergovernmental transfers with state agencies. The department is authorized and directed to develop and implement an intergovernmental transfer program for state and private facilities providing residential care for the mentally retarded. Upon implementation, the secretary shall report quarterly to the Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget as to the amounts received.

The department shall cooperate with any public agency other than a public hospital that provides health care services to Medicaid recipients and that desires to certify that such expenditures are eligible for federal financing participation. It shall assist any such public agency in identifying and meeting federal or other requirements to qualify for receipt of federal funds based on certification. In the event that a public agency qualifies for federal funds as a result of such certifications, DHH shall, with approval of the Joint Legislative Committee of the Budget, claim federal funds based on these certifications and pay such amount to the certifying public agency."
