If the committee finds that there are no adult education or reading programs in the parish in which the parolee is domiciled, the parolee is unable to afford such a program, or attendance would create an undue hardship on the parolee, the committee may suspend this condition of parole. one of the following:

- (a) A literacy program.
(b) An adult basic education program.
(c) A job skills training program.
(d) A GED certification.

(2) The provisions of this Subsection shall not apply to those parolees who have already obtained a GED or high school diploma or who are mentally, physically, or by reason of age, infirmity, dyslexia, or other such learning disorders, unable to participate.
