BY REPRESENTATIVE CREWS

AN ACT

To enact R.S. 17:2122 and 3996(B)(82), relative to education; to require school employees to use certain names and pronouns for students unless parents have provided written permission to do otherwise; to provide that a school employee shall not be required to refer to any person by certain pronouns if contrary to the employee's religious or moral convictions; to require each public school governing authority to adopt policies; to provide for civil liability; and to provide for related matters.

Read by title.

Reported with amendments by the Committee on Education.

HOUSE COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Amendments proposed by House Committee on Education to Original House Bill No. 121 by Representative Crews

AMENDMENT NO. 1

On page 1, line 7, after "policies;" and before "and to" insert "to provide for civil liability;"

AMENDMENT NO. 2

On page 2, line 16, after "school" and before "including" delete the comma "," and delete "whether paid or as a volunteer."

AMENDMENT NO. 3

On page 2, line 20, after "person's" and before "as" delete "biological sex" and insert "immutable biological sex, either female or male."

AMENDMENT NO. 4

On page 2, between lines 21 and 22, insert the following:

"(a) "Female" means an individual whose biological reproductive system is developed to produce ova and who has, had, will have, or would have, but for a developmental or genetic anomaly or historical accident, the reproductive system that at some point produces, transports, and utilizes eggs for fertilization.

(b) "Male" means an individual whose biological reproductive system is developed to fertilize the ova of a female who has had, will have, or would have, but for a developmental or genetic anomaly or historical accident, the reproductive system that at some point produces, transports, and utilizes sperm for fertilization."

AMENDMENT NO. 5

On page 2, delete lines 24 through 28 and insert the following:

"B.(1)(a) An employee shall not knowingly and intentionally address a student by a name other than the student's legal name, or a derivative thereof, without the written permission of the student's parent or guardian.

(b) An employee shall not be subject to adverse employment action for declining to address a student using a name other than the student's legal name, or a derivative thereof, or by a pronoun or title that is inconsistent with the student's sex."

AMENDMENT NO. 6

On page 3, at the beginning of line 7, delete "may seek relief." and insert "shall have a private cause of action for injunctive relief, monetary damages, reasonable attorney's fees and costs, and any other appropriate relief."

AMENDMENT NO. 7

On page 3, between lines 9 and 10, insert the following:

"(5) All civil actions brought pursuant to this Section shall be initiated within two years of the violation occurring."

On motion of Rep. Schlegel, the amendments were adopted.

On motion of Rep. Schlegel, the bill, as amended, was ordered engrossed and passed to its third reading.

To enact R.S. 17:412, relative to public school teachers, personnel, and students; to provide relative to discussion of sexual orientation or gender identity with students; to prohibit teachers and others from discussing their sexual orientation or gender identity with students; and to provide for related matters.

Reported favorably by the Committee on Education.

On motion of Rep. Schlegel, the bill was ordered engrossed and passed to its third reading.

AMENDMENT NO. 3

On page 1, line 20, change "1309(A)(1)(a)(i) and (M)(1)(a)," to "1309(M)(1)(a),"

AMENDMENT NO. 4

On page 9, line 25, after "fill a vacancy," delete the remainder of the line and delete lines 26 through 29, and on page 10, delete lines 1 through 6 and insert the following:

"the dates fixed in the proclamation shall be limited to the dates for primary elections and general elections established in Subsections B, C, and D of this Section. Except as otherwise provided by law, a special primary election shall be held on the first of the election dates established in this Section that is after the date on which the proclamation calling the special primary election is issued, provided that the proclamation is issued at least four weeks prior to the opening of the qualifying period for the special primary election. The authority issuing the proclamation shall consult with the secretary of state in the establishment of a qualifying period and election dates for special elections.

(2) Except for the office of representative in congress, the secretary of state shall not include the name of any candidate on any"

AMENDMENT NO. 6

On page 11, at the end of line 23, change "the noon" to "noon"

(3) An employee of a correctional facility, domestic violence shelter, juvenile detention facility, or public school who commits a sex offense as defined in R.S. 15:541 when determining the biological sex of a person over the age of seventeen shall be imprisoned with or without hard labor for not less than two years nor more than ten years. At least two years of the sentence imposed shall be served without benefit of parole, probation, or suspension of sentence.

B. The offender's lack of knowledge of a person's age shall not be a defense."
