

DEPARTMENT FUNCTIONS

Office of the Secretary

Executive and Administration Program

Executive and Administration

- Provides agency leadership, administration, finance, and legal services.
- Develops internal structure and processes.

FastStart Program

- Improves state economic competitiveness through benchmarking, ranking comparison, and developing plans to improve competitiveness of industry-specific growth sectors.
- Promotes state policy and economic development success to improve rankings with national economic development groups and publications.

Business Development Program

Community Competitiveness

• Provides assistance to local communities to increase their competitiveness and enhance regional business development efforts.

Small Business Services

• Includes the Small and Emerging Business Development Program and Small Business Development Centers which provide direct, one-on-one assistance to entrepreneurs and small businesses to encourage growth.

Business Expansion and Retention Group

• Reaches out to businesses across the state to learn about their challenges, assist with retention or expansion projects, and identify ways to make Louisiana a better place for business.

Business Marketing and Recruitment

• Promotes and markets to domestic and international companies to convince them to invest and grow their businesses in Louisiana.

Office of Entertainment Industry Development

• Promotes Louisiana as a destination for digital interactive media, film and television production, music, and live performance.

Office of International Commerce

- Manages initiatives focused on attracting foreign direct investment, increasing trade volumes and expanding trade-related manufacturing activity.
- Coordinates international marketing missions and manages protocol for visits of foreign dignitaries.

Provides information and technical assistance on Louisiana's various business tax incentive programs to business and industry to foster investment and job creation.


Board of Commerce and Industry







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FY19 EXPENDITURE TREND




Analysis shows approximately 25.7% or \$12.6 million in total means of finance budget authority could be unspent at year-end based on actuals through February and projections through the remainder.

Approximately \$10.9M of this funding would fall into Other Charges. Empty Federal Fund authority accounts for \$3.2M of this amount and \$2.7M is authority for the LA Entertainment Development Fund which has not seen any revenue collections in FY19. The remainder is for expenses such as FastStart and other programs whose timing is not annually consistent and unused funds are typically carried from one fiscal year to the next.

In FY18, the department did not spend \$19.3M or 31.6% of its budget authority comparing its end of year budget and actual expenditures factoring in funds carried into FY19.

POTENTIAL ADJUSTMENTS

Statewide Standard Adjustments - (\$466,282)

- \$24K Adjustments impacting salaries such as: market rate for classified, civil service training series, and the salary base coupled with attrition savings. 64% of these adjustments are funded in HB105 through other means of finance.
- \$237K Adjustments to related benefits including: Related benefits base, retirement rate, and group insurance rate. 43% of these adjustments are funded in HB105 through other means of finance.
- (\$85K) Adjustments to Other Charges including: OTS Service Fees and Legislative Auditor Fees corresponding with reductions for rent, procurement, Risk Management, and other services.
- (\$642K) Reduce to account for expenses from FY19 not needed in FY20.

Other Adjustments - \$1,978,471

- \$1M Means of finance swap that would substitute general fund for declining self-generated funds.
- \$400K Additional funding for the Tier 1 Regional Grant Award Program.
- \$330K Means of finance swap that would substitute general fund for declining funds forecasted for the Louisiana Economic Development Fund.
- \$185K Pass-through funding for the LA Procurement Technical Assistance Center at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette.
- \$125K Pass-through funding for the Coastal Technical Assistance Center at Nicholl's State University.
- (\$77K) Reduce funding to the FastStart Program.

10 Year FTE Positions/Salaries Expended





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
