## **Housing**

These bills provide affordable housing options particularly for residents of gubernatorially declared disaster areas.

HOUSE BILL NO. 385 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Provides that unreasonable rent increases to residential property in hurricane

devastated areas is an unfair trade practice.

BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

Status: Substitute Adopted on the House Floor and became – House Bill 1399

House Bill NO. 1399

**Abstract:** Provides for local zoning ordinances to include provisions for inclusionary zoning

for affordable housing.

HOUSE BILL NO. 1071

BY REPRESENTATIVE HUNTER, ALARIO, DEWITT, DORSEY, HAMMETT, JEFFERSON, RICHMOND, RITCHIE, AND SALTER AND SENATORS BAJOIE, HINES, MOUNT, AND NEVERS

Abstract: Enacts the Louisiana Housing Preservation Act. Provides relative to the

identification and rehabilitation of blighted housing property and procedures therefore and for the powers, duties, functions, and responsibilities of parishes,

municipalities, and courts relative thereto.

Status: Signed by the Governor – Act 355

#### HOUSE BILL NO. 999 BY REPRESENTATIVE HUNTER

**Abstract:** Provides relative to the Louisiana Housing Trust Fund.

Present law provides for the creation and administration of the Louisiana Housing Trust Fund by the Louisiana Housing Finance Agency. Monies in the Louisiana Housing Trust Fund are to be used for loans and investments to assist the development, rehabilitation, and preservation of affordable housing for low-income individuals and families and to address homelessness. Proposed law authorizes the Louisiana Housing Finance Agency to levy a two percent fee on the allocation of low income housing tax credits. Proposed law provides that the proceeds of the two percent fee is to be deposited into the Louisiana Housing Trust Fund.

SENATE BILL NO. 95 BY SENATOR BROOME

**Abstract**: Proposed law provides for the establishment of the Louisiana Habitat for Humanity

Loan Purchase Program Act within LHFA. Provides for LHFA to partner with Louisiana Habitat for Humanity affiliates through the purchase of homeowner

loans from the habitat affiliates.

Status: Signed by the Governor Act 510

SENATE BILL NO. 445 BY SENATOR JACKSON

Abstract: Proposed law provides that the Louisiana Housing Finance Agency shall give

priority to assisting municipalities and displaced citizens, of a declared disaster

area, with developing, rehabilitating, and preserving affordable housing.

Status: Sent to the Governor as of June 20, 2006

### **Criminal Justice**

These bills save valuable tax resources by developing alternate strategies to mandatory minimums and sentencing guidelines. These bills also provide for post conviction relief, education and rehabilitation options for the incarcerated.

HOUSE BILL NO. 956 & 1065

BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND & REPRESENTATIVE GLOVER

**Abstract:** Provides for post-conviction relief period within which to file an application for DNA

testing and for evidence preservation in such cases.

Status: Assigned to House Criminal Justice Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 600 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Authorizes offenders convicted of possession with intent to distribute certain

amounts of cocaine or marijuana to participate in work release programs.

Status: Assigned to House Criminal Justice Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 955 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Provides for education programs in private prison facilities.

Proposed law requires private prison facilities and parish prison facilities who house more that 100 state inmates to provide educational programs. Proposed law allows inmates with college degrees to serve as voluntary instructors. Proposed law authorizes the Dept. of Public Safety and Corrections to provide for "good time" for those inmates who serve as instructors or successfully complete

the educational program.

HOUSE BILL NO. 997 BY REPRESENTATIVE CRAVINS

**Abstract:** Provides that regional indigent defense centers are authorized to receive state

funding.

Status: Pending House Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 1019 BY REPRESENTATIVE GLOVER

**Abstract:** Clarifies the calculation of compensation for persons wrongfully incarcerated.

Status: Assigned to House Appropriations Committee

SENATE BILL NO. 126 BY SENATOR JONES

**Abstract:** Proposed law provides that in the interest of fairness in sentencing the more

lenient penalty provisions provided in Act 403 of the 2001 R.S. and Act 45 of the 2002 1st E.S. shall apply **b** those persons who committed crimes, who were

convicted, or who were sentenced prior to June 15, 2001.

Status: Signed By the Governor Act 45

SENATE BILL NO. 180 BY SENATOR JONES

Abstract: Proposed law retains present law but provides that any offender who was

convicted of a crime other than a crime of violence or a sex offense who has his probation revoked due to a technical violation of the conditions of probation shall

not be incarcerated for more than 90 days due to such revocation.

Status: Signed By the Governor Act 113

#### SENATE BILL BO. 187 BY SENATOR JONES

Abstract:

Proposed law creates an exception for any person convicted of distribution or possession with intent to distribute cocaine where the offense of conviction involves less than 28 grams of cocaine or any person convicted of distribution or possession with intent to distribute marijuana where the offense of conviction involves less than one pound of marijuana by allowing them to participate in the work release program and otherwise retains the provisions of present law.

Status: Failed Senate Final Passage

SENATE BILL NO. 228 BY SENATOR JONES

Abstract:

Proposed law provides that the court, after third conviction of certain non-capital felonies, or violations of the Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Law, may suspend, in whole or in part, the imposition or execution of the sentence, provided the defendant enters and completes a drug program approved by the Louisiana Supreme Court. Upon completion of the approved drug program, the defendant shall be placed on probation under the supervision of the division of probation and parole.

Status: Signed By the Governor – Act 581

SENATE BILL NO. 401 BY SENATOR JONES

Abstract:

Present law provides for the rules for post-conviction relief and generally requires all applications to be filed within 2 years after the judgment of conviction and sentence has become final. Present law creates an exception to the time period for filing an application for post-conviction relief by allowing inmates until August 31, 2007, to seek post-conviction DNA testing.

### SENATE BILL NO. 533 & SENATE BILL NO. 577 BY SENATOR JONES and SENATOR DUPLESSIS

Abstract:

Present law provides that any person who violates certain heroin related crimes shall be sentenced to imprisonment for not less than five nor more than 50 years at hard labor at least five years of which shall be served without benefit of probation, or suspension of sentence, and may, in addition, be required to pay a fine of not more than \$50,000. Proposed law provides that any person currently committed to the DPS&C and serving a sentence for certain heroin related crimes shall be credited for time served regarding the satisfaction of sentence and included in the calculation of years required for the Louisiana Risk Review Panel.

## **Emergency Preparedness**

These bills refine the state of Louisiana's role in emergency preparedness.

HOUSE BILL NO. 745 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

Abstract: Requires the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency

Preparedness and the DHH to notify the administration of healthcare facilities in the projected area 60 hours before landfall that they are required to evacuate their facilities if a mandatory evacuation is ordered and requires the notification to

include specified information.

Status: Assigned to House Judiciary Committee

SENATE BILL NO. 437 BY SENATOR FIELDS

**Abstract:** Present law provides for the development and implementation of an emergency

plan by the secretary of state in the event of a gubernatorially declared emergency or disaster occurring before or during a regularly scheduled or special election, subject to the approval of the governor and a majority of the members of each committee of the Senate Committee on Senate and Governmental Affairs, and the House Committee on House and Governmental Affairs and the members of each house by mail ballot. Limits such written emergency plan to proposing a resolution to technical, mechanical or logistical problems impairing the holding of the election with respect to the relocation or consolidation of polling places within the parish, potential shortages of commissioners and absentee commissioners, or shortages

of voting machines.

Proposed law retains present law but adds access to polling places for voters

displaced outside the state addressed in such emergency plans.

## **Voting**

These bills protect and promote the right of citizens to participate in the electoral process.

HOUSE BILL NO. 489 BY REPRESENTATIVE JEFFERSON

Status: Substitute Adopted on the House Floor Became HB 1393

HOUSE BILL NO. 1393

**Abstract:** Requires the secretary of state to examine the feasibility of changing the voter

registration deadline and authorizes the secretary of state to create a plan to do so

subject to approval by the legislature and governor.

Status: Signed By the Governor – Act 505

HOUSE BILL NO. 482 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Requires the State Board of Election Supervisors to provide for an annual job

performance evaluation for registrars of voters and provides that a registrar of voters who receives a rating of poor shall be subject to removal from office

pending a hearing.

Status: Failed House Final Passage

HOUSE BILL NO. 1088 BY REPRESENTATIVE MARCHAND

**Abstract:** Requires the secretary of state to include temporary addresses for certain

registered voters in the statewide voter registration database for purposes of

mailing information regarding elections or voting.

Status: Assigned to House & Governmental Affairs Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 818 BY REPRESENTATIVE JEFFERSON **Abstract:** Provides that a person who has been involuntarily displaced by a gubernatorially

declared state of emergency shall be considered a resident of the state and parish in which he is registered to vote, so long as such person has the intent to return.

HOUSE BILL NO. 641 BY REPRESENTATIVES JEFFERSON, K. CARTER, AND GRAY

**Abstract:** For an election in an area affected by an emergency for which the legislature has

approved the secretary of state's emergency plan, authorizes the registered voters of the affected area to vote during the early voting period at temporary satellite voting locations. Requires the secretary of state to conduct early voting and provides for the secretary of state to establish temporary satellite voting locations

in certain locations outside the state.

Status: Subject Call – House Final Passage

SENATE BILL NO. 86 BY SENATOR JONES

**Abstract:** Present law provides for the early voting period to be twelve to six days prior to

any scheduled election from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Saturday. Proposed law retains present law but also includes an additional day for early voting to be determined by the secretary of state for elections in the affected area for which the secretary of state has submitted an emergency plan to the legislature and the plan was approved by the

legislature.

Status: Signed By the Governor – Act 569

#### SENATE BILL NO. 166 BY SENATOR JONES

Abstract:

Proposed law provides for certain displaced persons who have registered by mail on or after October 5, 2004, but prior to Sept. 25, 2005, to vote absentee by mail without first voting in person at the polls or appearing or voting at the office of the registrar during or following a gubernatorially declared state of emergency. Proposed law also provides that 45 days prior to an election, the secretary of state shall deliver absentee ballots to the registrar's office for displaced voters residing outside of their voting district due to the disaster. Requires that each registrar shall mail the necessary instructions, certificates, ballots and envelopes to each displaced voter without a request at the address provided by the secretary of state.

### <u>Commerce</u>

Bills in this section are designed to regulate pay day loans; amend the laws governing the state's TIMED program to encourage contractors to hire more residents of Louisiana; to establish safeguards for predatory lending practices for home loans and to provide for certain property or income exemption from seizure by certain creditors; tax amnesty and encourage minority participation in the recovery efforts.

HOUSE BILL NO. 979 BY REPRESENTATIVE E. GUILLORY

**Abstract:** Provides for the use of minority-owned appraisal and related real estate

businesses in the state's recovery efforts.

HOUSE BILL NO. 407 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

Status: Substitute Adopted on the House Floor Became HB 1376

House Bill NO. 1376

Abstract: Enacts the Tax Delinquency Amnesty Act of 2006

Status: Assigned to Senate Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 822 BY REPRESENTATIVE QUEZAIRE

**Abstract:** Requires contractors to make a good faith effort to assure that at least 80% of the

employees employed on a TIMED project are Louisiana residents. Removes

requirement that contractors meet this standard.

SENATE BILL NO. 200

#### BY SENATOR MURRAY AND REPRESENTATIVE BRUNEAU

Abstract:

Proposed law prohibits any extender of credit to refuse to extend credit to any major or emancipated minor solely because of any foreclosure or giving in payment, or dation en paiement, resulting from damages caused by Hurricane Katrina or Hurricane Rita.

Proposed law prohibits an extender of credit, when determining whether to extend credit to a person, from relying upon a credit report which considers any foreclosure or giving in payment, or dation en paiement, resulting from damages caused by Hurricane Katrina or Hurricane Rita in determining the person's credit score, credit worthiness, or credit standing.

SENATE BILL NO. 298 BY SENATOR DUPLESSIS

Abstract:

Present law provides that a consumer's credit report may be used for insurance underwriting for personal insurance policies, such as auto and homeowners insurance. A consumer's credit report may be used by the insurance company, under certain circumstances to deny, cancel or non renew a policy or to charge the policyholder a higher premium. Federal law (15 U.S.C.A. 1681t) provides that states may regulate the use of credit reports to the extent that such laws are not in conflict with federal law.

SENATE BILL NO. 434 BY SENATOR FIELDS

**Abstract:** Proposed law creates the Louisiana Pay Day Loan Act, to regulate "pay day loans"

and requires the law to be liberally construed in order to protect consumers.

**Committee** 

#### SENATE BILL NO. 438 BY SENATOR FIELDS

**Abstract:** Proposed law creates the "Predatory Lending Prevention Act" to regulate high-cost

home loans for "borrowers" - defined as any individual obligated to repay a loan, including co-borrowers, cosigners, or guarantors. "Home loan" is defined as a loan where the principal amount of the loan does not exceed the conforming loan size limit for a single-family dwelling, and the loan is secured by a mortgage or deed of trust on real estate upon which a home is built or will be built. Excludes home loans, which are open-end lines of credit as defined in Part 226 of Title 12 of the

Code of Federal Regulations.

SENATE BILL NO. 471 BY SENATOR DUPLESSIS

**Abstract:** Present law declares certain property or income exempt from seizure by certain

creditors.

## **Land Use**

These bills are designed to protect landowner's ownership rights with respect to their property.

HOUSE BILL NO. 992 & 95
BY REPRESENTATIVE MARCHAND & REPRESENTATIVES RICHMOND & HONEY

Abstract: Prohibits the expropriation of private property for retail, office, commercial,

industrial, or residential development; or primarily for enhancement of tax revenue; or for transfer to a person, nongovernmental entity, public-private partnership,

corporation, or other business entity.

Status: HB 992- Senate Rejected Conference Committee Report

HB 95 - Assigned to House Civil Law & Procedure Committee

## Family Law

These bills are designed to protect the rights of families, parents and children either in parental or state custody.

HOUSE BILL NO. 90 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Requires a diligent search for parents of children in state custody.

Status: Signed By the Governor – Act 248

HOUSE BILL NO. 777 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Provides for taking children into state custody.

Status: Signed By the Governor – Act 278

HOUSE BILL NO. 60 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Enacts the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act.

Present law provides the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction Act (UCCJA) which was enacted in Louisiana in 1978 to help avoid jurisdictional competition and conflict with courts of other states in child custody matters and to deter abductions

of children to obtain a favorable custody award.

HOUSE BILL NO. 1099 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** To provide for the rights of foster parents in Louisiana.

Proposed law gives foster parents such rights as that prescribed in rules and

regulations promulgated by DSS.

House Bill No. 1370

**Abstract**: Provides for the Foster Parents' Bill of Rights

Status: Signed By the Governor Act 439

## **Education**

These bills further refine Louisiana's educational policy.

HOUSE BILL NO. 234 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Requires local public school boards to adopt policies prohibiting teachers from

recommending that a student be administered a psychotropic drug, suggesting a mental health diagnosis for a student, or using a parent's refusal to consent to the administration of such drug to a student or to a psychiatric evaluation, screening, or examination as grounds to prohibit the student from participating in any class or school-related activity or as the basis of accusations of child abuse or neglect by

the parent.

Status: Sent to the Governor as of June 20, 2006

HOUSE BILL NO. 143 BY REPRESENTATIVE GRAY

**Abstract:** Requires parents and legal quardians be informed of the option to take leave from

their employment for school-related activities.

Status: Assigned to House Labor & Industrial Relations Committee

SENATE BILL NO. 484 BY SENATOR MURRAY

**Abstract**: Present law provides that the recovery district shall be considered an intermediate

education unit and have the authority to seek, expend, manage and retain federal funding and grant funding. Proposed law retains present law but subjects the recovery district to any expenditures and/or liabilities corresponding with the

securing of federal or grant funding.

## **Healthcare**

These bills further refine Louisiana's healthcare policy.

HOUSE BILL NO. 972 BY REPRESENTATIVE JACKSON

**Abstract:** Creates the Sterile Syringe Access Pilot Program in East Baton Rouge Parish to

provide, at no cost to consumers 18 years of age or older, sterile syringes and needles to prevent the spread of HIV, hepatitis C, and other blood borne

pathogens.

HOUSE BILL NO. 831 BY REPRESENTATIVE JACKSON

Abstract: Creates the "Health Care Consumer's Right to Know Act" to provide for public

disclosure of price and performance data that is already collected on Louisiana's

hospitals and outpatient facilities.

Status: Assigned to House Health & Welfare Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 638 BY REPRESENTATIVE JACKSON

**Abstract:** Creates an office of behavioral health within DHH to be responsible for the

providing services and continuity of care for the prevention, detection, treatment, rehabilitation, and follow-up care of mental and emotional illness and addictive disorders. Administers residential and outpatient care facilities of the state for persons who are mentally ill and persons suffering from addictive disorders or co-

occurring mental illness and addictive disorders.

Status: Assigned to House Health & Welfare Committee

### <u>Insurance</u>

These bills protect consumer's rights with regard to the regulation of insurance.

HOUSE BILL NO. 592 BY REPRESENTATIVE K. CARTER

Abstract: Provides that an insurer's failure to take action within set time periods under

certain circumstances shall constitute an unfair claims settlement practice.

Status: Assigned to Senate Insurance Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 318 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Prohibits insurers from using 2005 credit information to underwrite or rate risks for

persons who resided in declared disaster areas in 2005.

Status: Sent to Governor as of June 20, 2006

### Labor

These bills provide for equal pay without regard to gender.

HOUSE BILL NO. 194 & 283 BY REPRESENTATIVE HUNTER & REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Provides for a gradual increase in minimum wage from October 1, 2006, through

July 1, 2007.

Proposed Law provides for an increase in minimum wage from \$5.15 to \$5.40 beginning October1, 2006.

Proposed Law provides for an increase in minimum wage from \$5.40 to \$5.65 beginning January1, 2007.

Proposed Law provides for an increase in minimum wage from \$5.65 to \$5.90 beginning April 1, 2007.

Proposed Law provides for an increase in minimum wage from \$5.90 to \$6.15 beginning July 1, 2007.

Proposed law provides that should the federal minimum wage increase to an amount greater than amounts set out in proposed law, the federal minimum wage applies.

HB 283 – Assigned to House Labor & Industrial Relations Committee

HOUSE BILL NO. 144 BY REPRESENTATIVE HUNTER

**Abstract:** This legislation creates the "Louisiana Equal Pay for Women" Act.

Proposed law defines certain terms used within proposed law including "employee" and "employer". Proposed law makes it unlawful for an employer to pay wages to an employee at a rate less than the rate at which the employer pays

wages to another employee of the opposite sex for the same or substantially similar work.

# **Elderly Affairs**

HOUSE BILL NO. 755 BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHMOND

**Abstract:** Creates the Trust Fund for the Elderly within the state treasury.

Proposed constitutional amendment establishes the Trust Fund for the Elderly.

Status: Assigned to House Appropriations Committee
